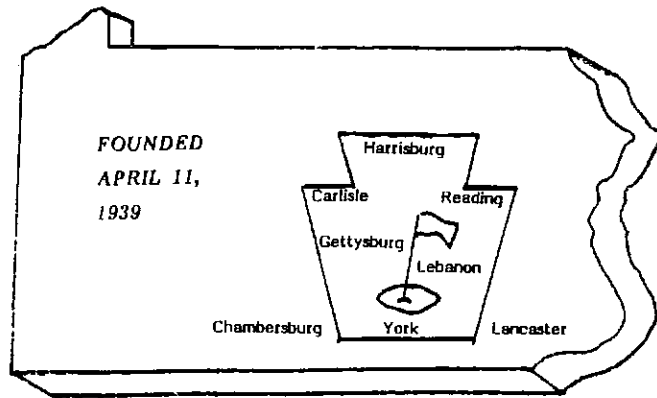

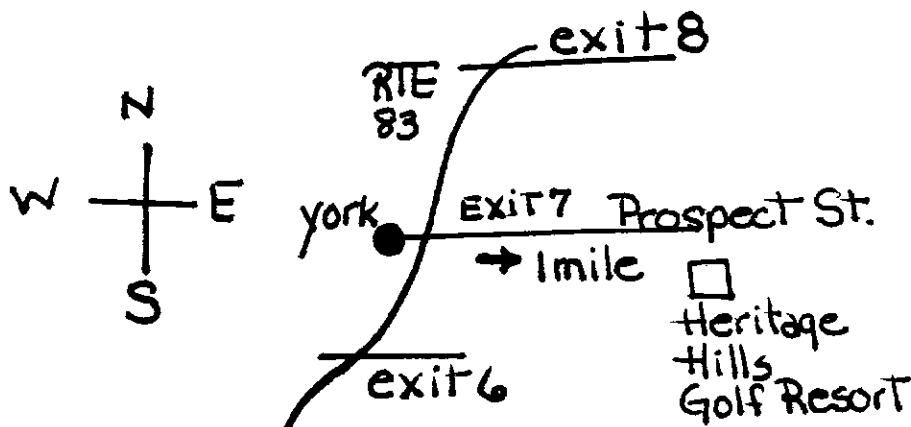

Our Host is Tony Goodley, CGCS. Tony moved to York in February 1988 as director of construction for Heritage Hills and then became the superintendent. Tony had previously been a superintendent at River Bend C.C. in Great Falls Virginia. Prior to that, Tony was a superintendent for twelve years at Loudoun Golf & C.C. in Purcellville, Va. Tony is a 1971 graduate of North Carolina State.

Construction first began in April 1988 on Heritage Hills. The Architect was Russell Roberts from Gaitersburg, Md. The contractor was Fitz & Smith from Dallastown, Pa. Heritage Hills offers a 18 hole public golf course, with a 18 hole miniature golf course as well as a 30 stall lighted driving range and clubhouse with full banquet facilities and fine dining at "Windows On The Green".

-The recent cold spell in April preceded by the heat in March produced a color variation on some perennial bio-types of *Poa annua*. The affected turfs turned dark purple or brown. This is an enviromental response-not a disease. The warm weather should turn things around.

-Ataenius-start inspecting for grubs in earyl May. Rainy weather can mask the damage!
