Subject: Drought Emergency

As most of you know by now the Governor has issued a drought emergency for 39 counties in Pennsylvania and a caution for the remaining counties, with the Philadelphia area being the exception. I have been in close contact with D.E.R. since the drought regulations have gone into effect and they have granted us some variances that the Philadelphia people didn't have in 1985.

Thanks to the work and the lobbying efforts the Philadelphia Superintendents put forth we are able to syringe heat sensitive grasses such as Poa and Bent and we are able to over seed August-October and water up to one inch per week after doing so. They didn't have those variances to work with and it made very difficult to survive.

We have the opportunity to sit down with D.E.R. after this is over and through facts and figures again have the chance to modify these regulations. Those of you who continue to use water in unlimited amounts are only making it more difficult for the future of the golf course industry in Pennslvania. So do us all a favor and comply with the regulations. The more compliance the more credibility we'll have when it's time to talk.



SUPERINTENDENT SPOTLIGHT

David Rafferty, Chambersburg Country Club

When David was eight years old he started delivering papers, one of his stops was at a pro shop, soon he was helping around the pro shop and also ran errands for the pro, after awhile he was working behind the counter. "THE THINKING SUPERINTENDENT"

John Chassard of Lehigh Country Club says that one the hardest things he has had to overcome in this business is communication. "I used to think it would be best if everybody would let me do my job and not ask any questions. I found this can be very detrimental. Rumors get started very easily by my golf course members, and the wrong answers and information get circulated around the men's grill. I discovered very quickly that I need to properly educate the people I work for and the public, for that matter. I began by writing a paragraph in the monthly newsletter called "Chassard's Turf Talk." I included things we were doing on the course and why we were doing them, and even giving them tips on their home lawn. I also made myself very visible on busy days and mostly weekends around the pro shop and men's grill, so people can ask questions and get the right answers. If possible, I take the time to play golf with some of the members, it's good public relations and I believe the best way for me to see and evaluate the golf course. This fall the grounds committee at the Club is hosting a cocktail party as an open forum to ask questions about things we do on the course and to let people know what we have planned for the future."

We are no longer grass cutters, golf course superintendents have become professional in many aspects. A major part of this profession is public relations, especially with the increased awareness regarding environmental affairs. The more we can communicate and be visible to give people the right answers, the better it will be for all of us.

INSECT TIP OF THE MONTH

You say you've noticed a lot of birds gathering in your fairways lately, not to mention the roughs, tee and green banks, maybe even some skunk or crow damage. Well, dudes, they're not there to pass along the latest gossip or for an annual family gathering, they are eating all those grubs you thought you took care of a few months ago.

Remember around the 4th of July when we were all bombarded with Japanese Beetles, well guess what happened when the males and females got together — Yup! That results in the offspring devouring your golf course. Now is the time to treat for them while their young are still close to the surface. If you don't treat them soon they're going to be around again next spring as they complete their metamorphosis, over wintering deep in the soil this winter and working their way back to the surface next spring, still chomping away at your gorgeous turf. There are many insecticides on the market that will do an admirable job, consult your County Extension Agent or chemical supplier for best results.

TURF TIP OF THE MONTH

"Ryegrass Fairways" — not something everyone is totally concerned with but for those who annually overseed their fairways with the millions of new ryegrass blends, this is for you. You're trying so hard to choke out all the other grasses but usually fall short due to disease, drought stress, traffic or just the overwhelming percentage of annual bluegrass (Poa). You've contemplated eradication programs but change your mind when you see the poa filling in all the bare spots, the first sign of cool weather in early Fall. Maybe it's time for you to try a "Prograss Program", I have and it works! One of our Chemical Guru's, Don Hollinger, recommends split applications of Prograss at 1 gallon per acre. The first application just about the time you notice germination in your overseeded ryegrass fairways, the second application 21 days after the first, again at 1 gallon per acre. The results the following Spring will make you an instant hero. Don compares the Prograss to ryegrass "like Cheerios to a kid."
