Course Profile

Harrisburg North Golf Course was built in 1960. It is 6,292 yards, Par 71, Slope 115 and rating 68.9. The golf course was changed to a golf resort in 1993. Many changes were made to the course over the past 8 years including a massive tree planting program, 11 miles of cart paths, and fairway irrigation.

USGA "Tip of The Month"

This is my first, "Tip of the Month" column for your newsletter. The topic was prompted by Mark DelSantro's comment in the February newsletter. To recap, Mark said, "managing turfgrass is not rocket science. Keep it simple and stick to the basics!"

I agree. Thus, as we begin managing our golf courses for the 1998 season, keep in mind the basics. A brief summary includes:

- Plants need sunlight to grow. At least 8 hours of direct sunlight per day is needed. The morning sunlight is the most important. Anything less is just that, less. The turfgrass will be less healthy. Fortunately, the reverse is also true. If you know tree work is needed, try to complete these projects as soon as possible. Bentgrass experiences most of its root growth in the spring.
- 2 Don't over-water. More bad things can happen with wet grass and soil, than with dry grass and soil. Also, it is easier to add extra water, than to remove an excess. When it comes to applying irrigation, have your best employees do it. Educate them on the need for even irrigation and not to saturate the soil...unless there is a special need.



Equally, grass needs enough fertilizer to grow at a reasonably active rate. With the amount of play most golf courses are now receiving, levels of fertility are gradually increasing. Always remember the basics ... 4-1-2 or 3-1-2 or even 4-1-4 ratios of N-P-K. Use soil tests to identify deficiencies on your fertilizer program and add supplements as necessary.

Keep it simple. Do not complicate the management of your golf course. If a new product sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Always test new materials on a nursery, a tee, the beginning of a fairway or the rough. Always leave a test strip or a non-treated area for comparison. Finally, when you have a doubt in your mind on what to do, do not use it. Rely on your instincts and common sense.

Keep it simple and stick to the basics.

Speaker Profile

The speaker for the May meeting will be Jim Blaukovitch. Jim is a native of Pennsylvania, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Landscape Architecture from the Pennsylvania State University. During the summer of 1972 and upon graduation in 1973 he was employed by the golf course architectural firm of Killian and Nugent. Jim was involved with many master plans for existing golf courses and numerous new courses, one of which was Kemper Lakes Golf Course in Illinois, listed among the top 24 public golf courses. Since that time, he has been actively involved in designing, building, remodeling, and irrigating golf courses. Jim is a certified golf course irrigation designer, a Registered Landscape Architect in Michigan and Pennsylvania, and a member of the American Society of Landscape Architects.



The Rules of the Game

Question: In playing a tee shot a player misses the ball. Before playing his next stroke, the player presses down the turf behind the ball. Is this permissible, considering the ball is in play?

Answer: Yes. Rule 13-2 permits eliminating irregularities of the surface on the teeing ground, whether or not the ball is in play.

Remember, the "teeing ground" is defined as a rectangular area two club-lengths in depth, the front and sides of which are defined by the outside limits of the two tee markers. A ball is outside the teeing ground when all of it lies outside the teeing ground.

Now, what if...

Question: A player's tee shot strikes a tree, resulting in his ball embedding in it's own pitch mark within the teeing ground of the hole being played. Considering that the teeing ground is not considered through the green, is the player entitled to relief?

Answer: The rules of golf does not contemplate such a situation. In equity (Rule 1-4), the player is entitled to relief without penalty and must follow the procedure prescribed in Rule 25-2 for a ball which lies through the green. The same principle would apply if there was interference by casual water (Rule 25-1b(i), ground under repair Rule 25-1b(i), or an immovable obstruction (Rule 24-2a).
