Course designer, P. B. Dye incorporated this history when designing the Mine Nine Holes and the Tailings Nine Holes on this former iron ore site. This par 72 course measures 5,878 from the regular tees.

Labor Day

The end of summer. . .

A signal to prepare for the rest of the year!

The Labor Day weekend is a benchmark that signifies the return to school, the end of a busy summer, and time for golf course turf aeration.

Preparing for the fall and winter weather can be a challenge due to the fact that most summer employees are returning to school. Dwindling crew size makes it much more difficult to complete cultivation tasks and regular daily maintenance. However, there are certain practices that should not be compromised, and aeration is one such practice.

Many courses have, or are about to aerify greens, tees, fairways and rough. There are many different aeration tools available to complete the necessary treatments. But no matter the machine, it is important to aerify, remove organic debris, and topdress to fill aeration columns to the surface. These columns allow the soil to breathe (gases are exchanged) and more importantly, stimulate root growth to prepare for winter weather. Aeration is one practice that should be performed proactively. Aeration dates should be on the calendar of events and it should be performed when it will be most beneficial. Important golfing events can then be scheduled to take place after the turf has healed.

Anthrachnose and dollar spot continues to be the pest issues most turf managers are battling. Timely cultural practices and fertilization will help control these pests. Late summer and early fall is an excellent time to begin fertilizing on a regular basis.

Directions to Iron Valley Golf Club

Iron Valley Golf Club is very easy to find, located just 200 yards off of US Route 322, convenient to the PA Turnpike, Interstate 78, 81 or 83.

From Philadelphia:

Take the PA Turnpike west to the Lancaster Exit 20. Turn left on to Rt. 72 North. Go approximately 1.5 miles, bear right onto US Route 322 East. Follow US Route 322 approximately 3 miles. Watch for signs to Iron Valley Golf Club. Turn left off of US Route 322, go 200 yards, turn right into Iron Valley entrance.

From Baltimore:

Take I-83 to York, take Market Street exit. Go straight ahead approximately ½ mile, turning right onto Rt. 30. Follow Rt. 30 to Lancaster. Take the Route 72 Exit and follow Route 72 North to US Rt. 322 East. Follow US Route 322 approximately 3 miles. Watch for signs to Iron Valley Golf Club. Turn left off of Rt. 322, go 200 yards, turn right into Iron Valley entrance.

From Harrisburg:

Take US Route 322 East towards Ephrata. Approximately 3 miles after the 322-72 split, watch for signs to Iron Valley Golf Club. Turn left off of Rt. 322, go 200 yards, turn right into Iron Valley entrance.

From Allentown:

Follow I-78 west to Route 72. Take Route 72 south through Lebanon. Approximately 5 miles south of Lebanon, take Route 322 East. Follow US Route 322 approximately 3 miles. Watch for signs to Iron Valley Golf Club. Turn left off of Rt. 322, go 200 yards, turn right into Iron Valley entrance.

Turf will recover from summer stress, pest damage and aeration much more rapidly. If seed needs to be introduced to speed the recovery process, treat with materials that contain phosphorous. If there are specific questions regarding aeration and fertility contact our offices; Keith Happ at 412-341-5922 or Darin Bevard and Stan Zontek at 610-696-4747.

There has not been a great deal of gray leaf spot activity on ryegrass. However, this does not mean the disease will not become a problem later in the season. Last season, gray leaf spot was a problem in mid-to-late September in several portions of the region. Continue to scout the course and submit samples for definitive diagnosis.

Terrorists are flying airplanes into buildings, killing nearly seven thousand unsuspecting persons and we're worried about chinch bugs, manganese, and the like! Are our priorities messed up or what? With the events of September 11th, 2001, a day unlike any I've ever seen, my brain has been bombarded with numerous thoughts and emotions. Let me apologize from the start for any confusion that may occur from jumping around from idea to idea. The external noise created by the events is simply too loud for me to concentrate my efforts on one thought. 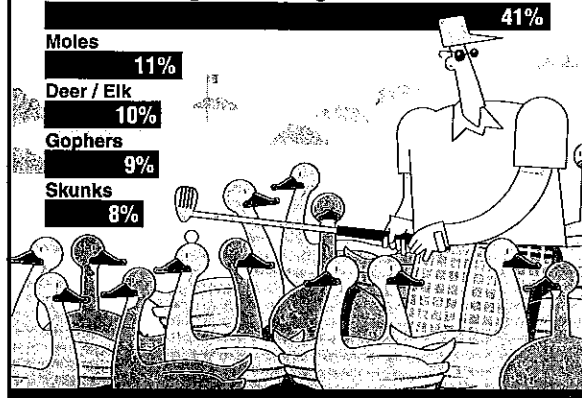

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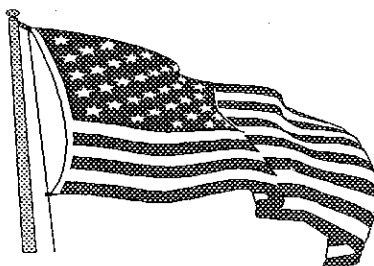
