Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Spring Has Sprung?

Has spring arrived? In the USGA Green Section's Mid Atlantic Region, it is a question people ask daily.

Of all the operations superintendents need to schedule at this time of the year, the application timing of preemergent herbicides for crabgrass control are critical. In order to be effective the products need to be applied to the surface of the ground prior to the germination of the crabgrass seed. Normally, there are all sorts of indicators as to when to apply preemergent herbicides. One of the most used (and most inaccurate) is the flowering of forsythia. With the weather we have experienced this year, forsythias were flowering in January!

Nonetheless, the normal guideline is to apply preemergent herbicides sometime between the middle of March and the middle of April. Obviously, in this Region, there is a difference between the eastern lowlands around the Chesapeake Bay and the mountains of western PA, VA and WV. In any event, it is time to start thinking about these applications, especially in the eastern parts of the Mid-Atlantic Region.

Compounding this timing has been the dry weather and mandatory water use restrictions for golf courses. It may be wise to apply a preemergent sooner versus later. Most preemergent products must be activated by water. We may be looking at an earlier timing this year than normal.

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
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Government Relations

From GCSAA Greens & Grassroots

H.B. 1591/S.B. 870 would regulate the location and construction of water wells and licensing of water-well contractors. The "Water-Well Construction Act" would give the Environmental Quality Board (EQB) the power to establish standards for the location, construction, inspection, alteration and temporary closure or decommissioning of water wells. The bill would establish standards for water-well registration and reporting requirements and develop criteria for issuing water-well construction permits. The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) would be responsible for overall administration of the water-well program. H.B. 1591 passed the House in November and was sent to the Senate for consideration.

Directions to Heritage Hills Golf Resort

- From I-83 north: Take I-83 south to Exit 18, Mount Rose Avenue At the exit, turn left onto Mount Rose Avenue (Route 124 east). Proceed east for 1 mile to the resort located on the right.
- From I-83 south: Take I-83 north to Exit 18, Mount Rose Avenue Off the exit bear to the right and proceed east for 1 mile to the resort located on the right.
- From Route 30 west: Take Route 30 east and continue to the Memory Lane exit. Off the exit bear right and continue through 5 traffic lights to Mount Rose Avenue (Route 124 east). Turn right and proceed east for 1 mile to the resort the right.
- From Route 30 east: Take Route 30 west to Columbia/York. Follow Route 30 west to the Mount Zion Road exit. Take the Mount Zion Road exit to the traffic light. At the traffic light turn left and continue south approximately 2 miles (7 traffic lights) to Mount Rose Avenue (Route 124 west). Proceed for 1/4 mile to the resort located on the left.

Drought Emergency Declared In Pennsylvania

As you may already be aware, Governor Schweiker has declared a drought emergency for 24 counties in Pennsylvania. Counties included in this emergency area are Adams, Berks, Dauphin, Lancaster, Lebanon, and York.

The DEP website is located at http://www.dep.state.pa.us. This web-site will provide information on a wide range of topics, including drought regulations, guidelines, and application forms. The use of water for irrigating golf course turf has been declared non-essential. However, a Golf Course Drought Emergency Operations Plan can be obtained from the web-site and once it is filed, specific and defined irrigation practices can be employed.
