Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Winter Thoughts

By Stanley Zontek, Director updated 12-5-03

Prior to the upcoming holiday season, there still may be a few golf course maintenance items to consider. These include:

- Snow mold prevention. In the Mid-Atlantic Region, we are having a colder than normal fall. As we continue to visit golf courses, only a few patches of pink snow mold have been seen. Nonetheless, now is the time of the year to begin planning for your snow mold prevention applications on high value turf areas like greens, tees, approaches, and, where appropriate, fairways. Snow mold control remains one of the few straightforward applications. Simply follow the timing and rates on the label of your favorite product or product combinations.
- Dormant fertility. If you want to get grass off to a quicker start next spring, apply fertilizer now. While there is always some debate about which product is best, the fact remains that any fertilizer applied will help the grass next spring. This is especially true for root growth. As long as the ground is not frozen, roots continue to grow. Fertilizer can help develop roots (depending upon the weather) between now and next spring.



DEP Water Resource Management Update

Act 220: Making Pennsylvania a leader in Water Resource Management and Conservation

Not only is water resource management and conservation essential to protecting the environment and keeping residents healthy, but it also is vital for fueling the economy. Water is a strategically important resource that can provide a competitive advantage in helping Pennsylvania attract and retain businesses and jobs.

In 2002, the Pennsylvania General Assembly enacted the Water Resources Planning Act (Act 220), designed to help the state better assess and plan for current and future water uses and needs. Pennsylvania is committed to making sure we have answers to basic questions such as how much water we have, how much we use and how much we need. Achieving this goal depends upon water use registration by all turf related businesses.

Act 220 requires individuals and operations that withdraw or use more than 10,000 gallons of water per day from their own source (s), averaged over any 30-day period, to register their water use with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. Those users whose sole source of water is from a Public Water Supplier do not need to register their use at this time. Users of less than 10,000 gallons per day are asked to register voluntarily. This information will be used as the foundation to update Pennsylvania's State Water Plan, which will involve stakeholders at both regional and statewide levels.

Why is this legislation so important? Consider these facts:

- The State Water Plan has not been updated in over 25 years, and it does not tell us which areas have critical water needs. As a result, we do not know who is running out of water until wells and local supplies dry up.
- Since 1900, residential use of water has increased from 5 gallons to 62 gallons per person per day. Total water use in Pennsylvania has climbed to 10 billion gallons per day, and there are increasing conflicts over the same sources of water.
- Only about 5 percent of the municipalities in Pennsylvania know their "water budget" how much water is available and how much is being used.
- Last year alone, 27,000 new homes were built in Pennsylvania.
- 18,000 new wells are drilled in Pennsylvania each year.
- Pennsylvania has experienced drought conditions during eight of the past 10 years.


Business, industrial and agricultural users will receive a pre-registration form in the mail, asking them to choose a method of registration, either on-line using a pre-assigned pin number, or by completing a paper copy. A registration form will be required for each source of water and must be returned or completed on-line to the Bureau of Watershed Management no later than March 16, 2004. A representative of the Bureau will be attending the following Turf conferences and trade shows.

- Eastern PA Turf Conference and Trade Show, January 13-15, 2004
- Northeastern PA Turf School and Trade Show, January 29, 2004
- Western PA Turf Conference and Trade Show, February 23-25, 2004

At these conferences you will be able to ask questions and receive assistance in completing the required registration forms. Those wishing assistance in completing the forms should bring all the necessary documentation including pump test records, drilling records and water use records for all sources for 2003.

Help us get a comprehensive water resources picture for Pennsylvania. It's not only good for Pennsylvania, it's good for business, too.



Pennsylvania Turfgrass Council 2003 Distinguished Service Award

The Pennsylvania Turfgrass Council (PTC) annually recognizes an individual who has exhibited outstanding service to the turfgrass industry. On October 6, a specially appointed President's Committee of PTC announced Stanley J. Zontek as the recipient of the 2003 Distinguished Service Award. An employee of the United States Golf Association, Mr. Zontek has been Director, Green Section for the Mid-Atlantic region since 1985.

The award was formally presented in front of an audience of nearly 600 industry leaders during the Penn State Golf Turf Conference on November 12 in State College. Mr. Zontek, a long-term Council member, was honored for championing the Penn State turfgrass program over many years and for his support of initiatives both within Pennsylvania and nationally that have improved the status of the industry.


Now operating out of an office in West Chester, PA, Mr. Zontek is the senior agronomist with the USGA and their longest tenured employee. In 1971 he took a job as Agronomist, USGA Green Section, Northeastern Region shortly after his graduation from Penn State with a degree in Agronomy Turfgrass Management. Through the years, he served as director for the Northeast Region and the North Central region before assuming his present position as Director for the Mid-Atlantic Region.

He also had hands on experience as a Research Technician at Penn State University and as a groundsman at Rolling Green Golf Club, Springfield, PA; White Manor Country Club, Malvern, PA, and Manor Country Club, Rockville, MD.


Recognized throughout the industry for his expertise and dedication, Mr. Zontek was previously awarded the Don Rossi Humanitarian Award by the Golf Course Builders Association and the Eb Steiniger Man of the Year Award by the Philadelphia Golf Course Superintendent's Association. He is also an honorary member of several regional GCSA chapters and is a frequent speaker at local, regional, national and international turf conferences.

Mr. Zontek is a member of the American Society of Agronomy and a Certified Professional Agronomist (CPAg), as well as holding membership in the National Honor Society of Agriculture (Gamma Sigma Delta), and the USGA Green Section Award Committee. He is the author of numerous articles on turfgrass management and served on the editorial board for Turf Management for Golf Courses by James B. Beard. His history of the Penn State turf program is included on the PTC website, www.paturf.org.

PTC President Jerred D. Golden bestowed the Distinguished Service Award honors on behalf of the 900 members of the Council.
