## Golf Course Profile

The original property was a 69-acre farm. In 1928, three pitch and putt holes were opened. A nine-hole course was available for play in 1930. In 1935, a purchase of 95 additional acres allowed for a second nine to be built which opened in 1938.

In 1943, Ed Tabor took over as Golf Professional and Golf Course Superintendent. Tabor applied the Donald Ross style to his next decade of reconstructing, redesigning and reshaping of West Shores' greens and fairways. The course remains intact from those days, except for the two-year redesign of bunkers by noted golf course architect Gil Hanse in the Spring of 2004.

## Superintendent Profile

Mike May began his career working for "Whitey" Boltz at Manada Golf Club while in high school. He is a 1975 graduate of the Penn State Turfgrass Management Program and began his career as an Assistant Superintendent at White Manor Country Club located near Philadelphia. ## Mid-Atlantic USGA Update Planning Ahead

Practically every superintendent we visit has some amount of tree work that is performed each year. This is usually relegated "winter work", but why is this?

If pressed for an answer, most superintendents like to do underbrush clearing, limb pruning, and tree removal when golfers are not around. Oftentimes there are a lot of questions about removing trees, and it can be an unpopular chore. Thus, superintendents tend to put the work off to the extent possible.

If thought about in another way, an opportunity is being missed. Most tree work is done to improve the health of the grass, be it to provide more hours of sunlight per day or to improve air drainage. If trees are removed earlier in the fall, the grass has the opportunity to grow under improved conditions during the time of the year when cool season grasses grow the best. In the fall roots are developed, maximum rhizome spread occurs, and grass begins to store energy-rich carbohydrates for the winter. Wouldn't it be better if the offending trees were removed while the grass still has the last remaining weeks of good growth?

People will grumble about removing trees, but won't they also grumble if the trees are removed, but the grass is not all that much better next spring? Do the tree work now so that the grass has the best growing conditions during the optimum time of the year.

### Insect Activity

Keep an eye on grubs. Most golf courses we visit are seeing grub activity even though insecticides were applied earlier

in the year. Spot-treat to control these insects because the grub stage of Japanese beetles, Northern Masked Chafers, and European Chafers will feed on the roots through the fall and all of next spring. Address the problem sooner versus later. Root feeding insects and the subsequent resulting damage from crows and skunks digging for them, can cause sizeable areas of grass to be destroyed. Grub activity in the Mid-Atlantic Region seems to be on the increase.

### Final Thoughts

The fall is a great time for a Green Section visit! This is the time to look back upon the year, evaluate what programs worked, and prioritize what areas on the course need to be improved. Then programs and procedures can be put into place to solve these problems, striving towards a better golf course in the future. That's planning ahead at its best and your USGA agronomists can help accomplish this goal.

If you happened to miss the meeting and/or haven't had the opportunity to play the golf course, I'd strongly recommend you find the time to do so. It is most certainly a fair and enjoyable test of golf! Additional kudos go to Danny Davis... he had a hole-in-one at Honeybrook on the tenth hole, a relatively long par 3... I believe he hit a two iron into a slight breeze. Sounds like his ball never took its eyes off the hole... just one of those shots that looked good all the way. Congratulations Dan!

For those into reading books (golf or other)... I know that reading isn't a very high priority in Heather and Gorse land, but one of the funniest books I've ever enjoyed is David Faherty's, Somewhere In Ireland A Village Is Missing An Idiot. Faherty is the CBS On Course Roving Golf Announcer. Some of you may have taken advantage of the opportunity to see Mr. Faherty as the keynote speaker at the Syngenta Green Carpet Premier last February in San Diego. Well if you liked him at that event, you'll like him even more in this book. This book is laugh out loud funny. I mean that's funny, I don't care who you are! Tiger's record, following the Oakland Hills event, is 7-11-2, which puts him at a clip of 45%. Not great by greatness legacy standards. Even sadder is the fact that Tiger came into the pro golfing world with the reputation of being the best match play player in the world, having won three straight U.S. Amateurs championships. To his credit, he has finished relatively strong at each of the World Match Play Championships the past four or five years, winning the championship this past February. It would just be a shame if Tiger's legacy as one of the greatest golfers ever, was overshadowed by his lacklustre Ryder Cup performances.

Of course, I know Tiger should not be left alone to shoulder the blame for the U.S. Ryder Cup demolition at the hands of Euros. There were ten others who contributed to the U.S. team's sub-par performance. Chris DiMarco (2-1-1) was the only U.S. player who had a semi-respectable winning record. On the European side there were only two golfers out of twelve who had losing records... Thomas Level (1-2-0) and Miguel Angel Jimenez (1-3-0) and somehow I am quite certain that their champagne tasted just as sweet as Lee Westwood's, Paul McGinley's, Padraig Harrington's, Sergio Garcia's, Colin Montgomery's, Darin Clarke's, and the remaining team members.

The really big question is how does the next U.S. Team Captain motivate these U.S. players to perform at a higher level down the road at the next Ryder Cup in Ireland in two years? The average TV golf drone would probably think to just ask Johnny Miller, as he seems to know all about everything when it comes to golf. In this case though, I would digress from an agency I wish were on the outside to an actual outside agency... on Saturday of the Ryder Cup matches I saw an on-the-course interview with

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Chuck Daly, former coach of the Detroit Pistons. The interviewer asked him what advice he'd give to the U.S. players and Hal Sutton, U.S. Team Captain? His answer was essentially for the U.S. players to forget the team concept (because, quite frankly, they aren't team players) and to perform to the best of their abilities as individuals (because that is exactly what they are). I'm always intrigued by how good coaches can give good, sound, simple advice no matter what the sport. Maybe the next U.S. Team Captain can heed this advice two years down the road.

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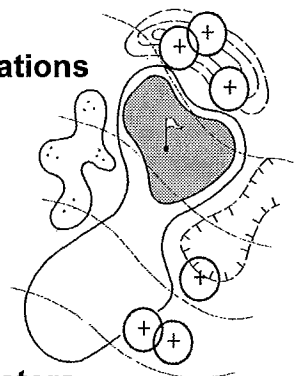
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## The Vote: Next Generation

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## Frost delays



### How can a footprint be a killer?

When it's a footprint made on a putting surface that's covered with frost. It's hard to believe that simply walking across a golf green covered with frost can cause so much damage, but the proof will be there in a few days as the turfgrass dies and leaves a trail of brown footprints. That's why most courses will delay starting times until the frost has melted. And it's also why golfers who appreciate a quality putting surface will be patient during frost delays.

### Why does frost cause problems?

Greens are fragile. The putting surface, or green, is an extremely fragile environment that must be managed carefully and professionally. Remember that every green is a collection of millions of individual grass plants, each of which is a delicate living thing. Obviously, Mother Nature never meant for these plants to be maintained at 3/16 or even 1/8 of an inch for prolonged periods. This stress makes greens constantly vulnerable to attacks from insects, disease, heat, drought, cold -- and frost.

Frost is essentially frozen dew. It can form when the temperature (or wind chill) is near or below the freezing point. The ice crystals that form on the outside of the plant can also harden or even freeze the cell structure of the plant. When frosted, the normally resilient plant cells become brittle and are easily crushed. When the cell membranes are damaged, the plant loses its ability to function normally. It's not much different than cracking an egg. Once the shell is broken, you can't put it back together.

### The proof is in the prints

Although you won't see any immediate damage if you walk on frosted turf, the proof will emerge within 48 to 72 hours as the leaves die and turn brown. And, since just one foursome can leave several hundred footprints on each green, the damage can be very extensive.

### Thanks for understanding

The damage isn't just unsightly -- putting quality will also be reduced until repairs are made. Those repairs are expensive and, in some cases, the green may have to be kept out of play for days or weeks until the new turfgrass is established. A short delay while the frost melts can preserve the quality of the greens, prevent needless repairs and may even save you a few strokes the next time you play.

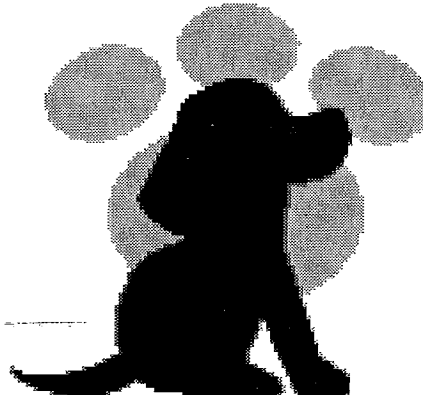
