Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

From a Taste to a Mouth Full of Summer!!

The first few days of summer bring longer days, warmer nights, and, often, higher humidity. The weather not only affects how enjoyable it is for us to play the game; it affects how the turf plays. We are already starting to hear the cries of golfers," The greens seem slower today. Did you raise the mowing height?"

While a very few may raise the mowing height to protect the turf, the majority do not raise cutting heights during periods of high heat and humidity. Solid rollers are often used rather than the grooved or Whiele attachments. The differences in playing condition can often be attributed to humidity and swollen thatch. When the air is saturated very little moisture evaporates from the soil and turf. That "puffiness" described in our last update may be a function of weather and not an agronomic practice. Don't become overly aggressive with mechanical means of preparing the surfaces for play. Infrequent rolling may be the best strategy to overcome the natural change in growth response.

Second generation adult Hyperodes weevil populations have been exhibited on greens, collars, and fairways. It is important to scout and monitor activity so site-specific control strategies can be used. Control adult populations to break the cycle of weevil production. These populations have

been reported as far south as Charleston, West Virginia in the western part of the region and well into Maryland in the eastern part of the region. Don't assume yellowing turf is drought stress. Cut into the soil to examine the upper portion of the profile.

One of the frequently asked questions has centered on Poa annua flowering. Many superintendents have experienced Poa annua flowering even after using control methods earlier in the season. The flowering may be a response to environmental stress, and flowering is a survival mechanism. Seed is produced for the generation of new plant material. The late flowering has been tight to the canopy, and has not been reported to be negatively affecting playability.

Finally, water for irrigation purposes has become an issue in several portions of the region. Irrigation water levels in holding ponds are actually down for the first time in almost two years. Concerns are being expressed about the need to ration so that ample reserves are available for the rest of the season. If you have a concern in your area, study the local and/or state regulations for guidance. Many states and municipalities now have drought regulations in place. It is never too early to plan.





Directions to French Creek Golf Club

From Pennsylvania Turnpike East to West

Take Downingtown (Old Exit 23, New 312) and go north on Route 100 approximately 4.1 miles to Route 401. Turn left heading West for 6.2 miles and pass Route 345 (Bulltown Road). Club entrance is on the right about ½ mile past Route 345.

From Pennsylvania Turnpike West to East

Take Old Exit 22, New 298 (Morgantown). Take Route 10 South to Route 23 East. Head East on 23 for approximately 3 miles to y-intersections right onto Route 401. Club entrance is on the left about 3 miles.

From Downingtown/West Chester and points South

Take Route 322 West through Guthriesville. At Route 82, turn right and follow to the stop sign at Loag's Corner where Route 82 turns left and Route 345 proceeds straight. Go straight on Route 345 and follow to Route 401. At 401, turn left heading West. Club entrance is on the right about ½ mile.

From Philadelphia

Take Route 202 South to Route 401 West. After crossing Route 100, go about 6.2 miles until you pass Route 345 (Bulltown Road). Club entrance is on the right about ½ mile past Route 345.

USGA Maintenance Alert

Your USGA agronomists in the Mid-Atlantic Region are seeing a wide range of problems on golf courses this summer as a result of the weather. The problems range from diseases like Pythium (both surface and soil borne), anthracnose (foliar and basal rot), brown patch, dollar spot and algae. Of special interest has been a recurrence of bacterial wilt of *Poa annua*, principally on greens.

Insects are also causing problems. These include a resurgence of the Japanese beetles and continuing concerns about chafers. Remember, the adult Japanese beetles fly during the day and the chafers fly at night. Other special interest insects are the Hyperodes weevil and billbugs, which are becoming active throughout the region. Cutworms, sod webworms and armyworms are also affecting turf.

Turfgrass is also declining due to *STRESS*. In fact, turfgrass samples from plant disease diagnostic labs are showing that, even with the disease and insect problems, the majority of the turf is being affected by mechanical damage! This is mower damage. Greens and collars have been particularly affected.

It may be prudent to follow a Conservative Maintenance and Management Program as long as this weather pattern continues. Raise mowing heights (golfers may have to tolerate slower green speeds); switch from grooved to solid rollers; reduce mechanical abrasion to the grass by deferring aggressive grooming, topdressings and vertical mowings; defer mowing, especially on wet, saturated greens (roll vs. mow?); compress fungicide spray intervals; surface aerate; spoonfeed the grass with light rates of nitrogen and iron; and, as always, manage water carefully.

It has been at least two years since the Mid-Atlantic Region has experienced extended periods of heat, humidity, drought and now torrential rains. None of us knows what the future holds. Be careful, it's a tough summer.
