Mid-Atlantic USGA Update Has Spring Finally Sprung?

As this update is being written it is raining. While dry weather in the spring is good for root development, the ground was getting too dry, and extensive mid-May watering somehow seemed to be too early of a start. The old timers have always said, once you start to water you never seem to stop.

The cool spring temperatures have impacted the grass in areas where growth regulators have been applied. In our travels we have observed almost every golf course that has applied growth regulators, alone or in blends, experience bentgrass discoloration. The *Poa annua, while regulated, is not* affected. This is a classic cold weather/growth regulator effect. Be patient; with warmer temperatures the grass will grow out of this condition. A little soluble nitrogen and iron also can help.

Zoysiagrass and bermudagrass fairways, while green, just are not growing. Remember, there is a good reason why they are called *warm-season grasses*. *It sure has* not been all that warm during the day, but especially at night. Again, be patient, and quick-release nitrogen from granular fertilizers such as urea and ammonium sulfate are best used now.

"Global warming" doesn't seem to be the case this spring in the Mid-Atlantic. More than a few superintendents in the Mid-Atlantic Region would like to have warmer temperatures to get the grass growing for the 2005 golf season.





Palmer, Player, Nicklaus, Norman... l'est we forget Johnny "the yipper" Miller and his 1-½ year dominance back in the early to mid 1970's... for over fifty years Iron Byron's streak has been virtually untouchable. The critics are complaining that during Tiger's streak there were some tournaments where there wasn't a cut line. Additionally, I've heard comments to the fact that he had to scramble late in the second round on several occasions in the past few years to make the cut. I personally find this logic absolutely ridiculous!

I never saw Jumpin' Joe play baseball... I did happen to see him sell a few Mr. Coffee coffee makers! OK, so let me get this straight, Joe DiMaggio never got a hit in his final at bat to continue his revered 56 game hitting streak? What about Cal Ripken or Brett Favre? I think the problem is that as a golf society, we've come to take Tiger Woods' greatness for granted. He went through a period from 1999 through 2001, where he wasn't just feared by his competitors, his ability left the other PGA Tour players simply shaking their heads and playing for second place.





From One Extreme To Another

After all the cold weather this spring, it's hard to believe the Mid-Atlantic Region is in the midst of a dry period. The northern tier of the region, for example, has experienced humidity levels more common to Arizona. Several days of 15% humidity were reported. We have gone from winter wet and slop to hard ground and growing grass in a hurry. Many golf courses are just now beginning to staff for the season.

The weather is always a challenge, but this is no time to panic and indiscriminately irrigate to excess. If the turf needs water, do so judiciously using hand held hoses where warranted. Examination of soil structure during Turf Advisory Service visits show there is plenty of water remaining in the soil profile. Remember that grass roots grow in pore spaces in the soil. Don't risk over saturating the soil and compromising the health of turf and root development before summer weather is upon us. Now is the time to focus on turf health, and not just color.

Adult Black Turfgrass Ataenius (BTA) has been observed on greens and collars. Hyperodes weevil activity cannot be far behind. Take time to scout critical areas of the course to determine when and where treatments are needed. Be proactive with these pests. Don't allow the turf to become damaged later in the year from a preventable pest issue.

Most courses have finished core cultivation practices on greens, collars, tees and even fairways. Completing this work will provide tremendous benefit as the season progresses. Organic (thatch) management is a foundational turfgrass management issue. Make every effort not to compromise course conditioning for the long term. Get this work completed. This is one time when jumping on the bandwagon is a good thing.
