Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Waiting for Spring

On March 20th at 1:26 PM, spring officially begins. This fact may be hard to remember with the current weather pattern. Below normal temperatures have slowed golf course green-up and are preventing greens that have been aerated from healing in a timely fashion. Soon enough, warmer temperatures will occur, and golf course conditions will rapidly improve. Several agronomic and administrative issues should be on your mind right now.

Labor. It is not too early to begin advertising for seasonal help for those who need it. High school and college students are beginning to think about their summer plans. Your golf course could benefit from addressing this issue sooner rather than later.

Poa annua Seedhead Control. Seedhead control applications are just around the corner. Timing is critical for these applications to be effective. Early or late application will lead to poor seedhead suppression. Generally, application timing varies throughout our region from the last week of March through the second week of April, depending upon weather and location. Be sure to double check application rates of selected products as well. A misapplication at this point in the growing season can make for a very long summer if damage occurs.

Fertilizer Applications. At this early point in the growing season, nitrogen fertilizer applications should be conservative. Keep in mind that natural organics will take longer to release

Allied Update

The Pennsylvania DEP is very close to announcing a drought watch for the entire state. If this happens Act 220 will go into effect. The percentage of compliance with Act 220 is approximately 60% for the state. For those courses that have complied, the filing is only good for three years, so check your records. For those courses that have NOT complied, you need to act immediately.

than synthetic products such as ammonium sulfate and urea. Aeration holes will heal more quickly with light applications of readily available nitrogen fertilizers. Natural organics can be applied at the time of aeration. However, unless they are blended with readily-available sources, they will do little to promote healing from aeration at this early point in the growing season. Natural organics will release more readily as soil temperatures increase.

USGA Turf Advisory Service. If your course plans to subscribe for a Green Section visit this year, be sure to take advantage of our *early payment discount*. If your course has not received your 2006 invoice, or you wish to have a Green Section visit this year, please contact one of our offices, Pittsburgh, (412) 341-5922 and/or Glen Mills, (610) 558-9066.

Now is also the time to take a deep breath as we prepare for the meat of the growing season. While the early spring is a busy time, stress levels for the turfgrass (and hopefully golf course superintendents) are lower. Take time to enjoy the spring before the stress on the turfgrass and the people who take care of it increases tremendously!

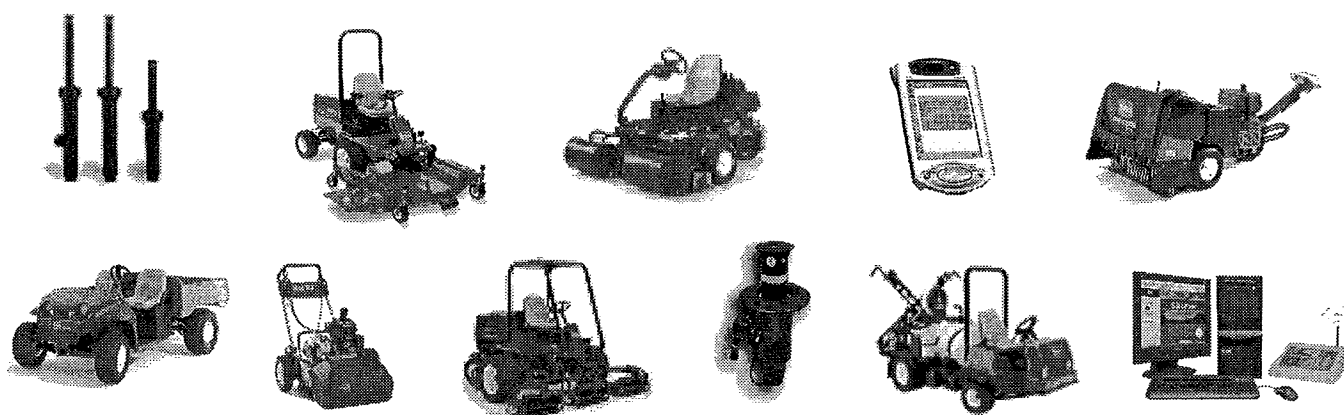
Facility Manager (FM) Class

Heather and Gorse

What a world, what a world... Why can't we all just get along? Just one more great reason not to worship the most dysfunctional group of people in the world... TV and movie stars. 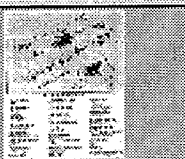

guests and club championship events alike. Additionally, the communication gap always created numerous inefficiencies that cost the business more time and money. My concerns are focused on the consumer.

Ultimately, it will cost more money for businesses to employ these immigrants, legally or illegally, but the net effect of increased expenses, with no greater revenue generation translates in my language to greater cost to the consumer. And in this real world scenario, the consumer is you! In other words, more pressure on your maintenance budget and greater costs outlay to your membership in a world where budgets seem to have stagnated and/or regressed and memberships are struggling. This is a scary scenario for a golf industry that was hoping and praying for a prosperous economic turn around in the short term.

I guess the silver lining in all of these storm clouds is that the politicians and the immigration attorneys of this world will have an opportunity to increase their wealth and hear themselves talk some more... so they got that going for them, which is nice. 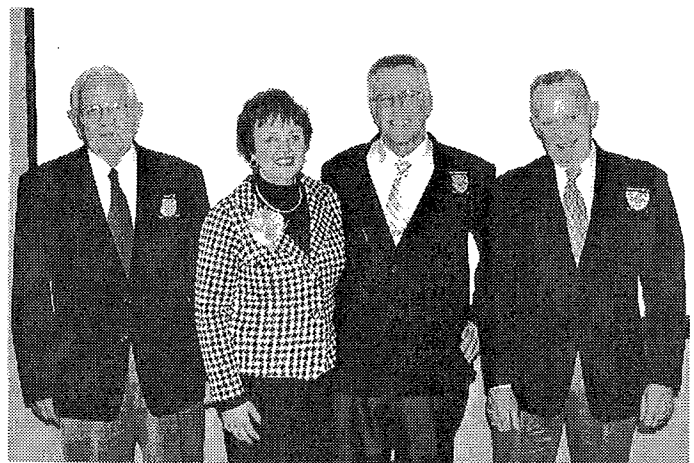

Happy 67th Anniversary CPGCSA!!!!

On Tuesday evening April 11, 1939 a meeting was held at the Colonial Country Club in Harrisburg for the purpose of organizing the greenskeepers of the area. Those in attendance at this meeting were George Morris, Riley Heckert, Hugh McJunis, James Morrison, Charles Bolton, John Grove, Jack Narril, and Al Heron. At this meeting it was decided to call the group "The Central Pennsylvania Greenskeepers Association". Officers elected were George Morris - President, Hugh McJunis - Vice President, and Riley Heckert - Secretary-Treasurer. Meetings were scheduled for the second Monday of each month with monthly meetings March through November. Dues to cover expenses were set at \$3.00 and the first meeting was set for May 8, 1939 at the Colonial Country Club.

Riley Heckert sent letters to all greenskeepers in the area to announce the gathering. The day started with golf in the afternoon and was followed by dinner. Following dinner Mr. Musser and Mr. Benham from State College and County Agent Fromeyer spoke about fairway grasses, heights of cut for bluegrass and fertilization. Following the educational sessions a business meeting was held and Edward Zwick and E. P. Morris were taken into the Association as new members, raising the membership to ten.

During 1939 the membership grew to thirteen members and at the November meeting the members decided that they wanted to continue meeting throughout the winter rather than wait until March as originally planned.

The Association was a success, just as today, 67 years later.

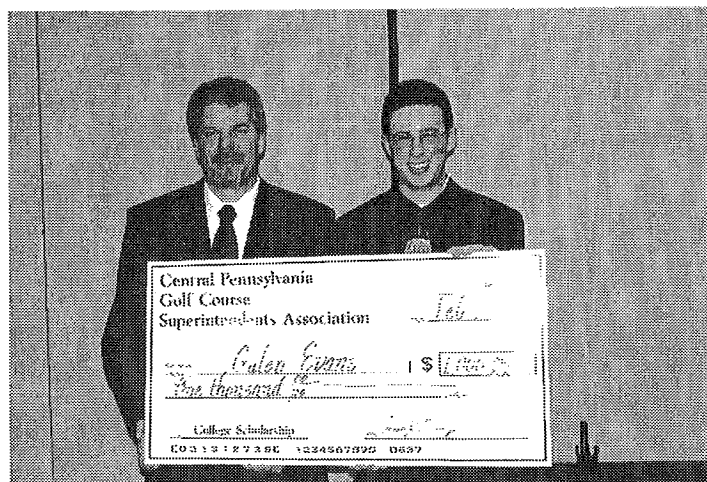
