Superintendent Profile

This is the second season as superintendent for Jed Vail at Pilgrim's Oak. He originally started in the landscape management field in the Reading area in 1997. After 3 years and a terrible drought in 1999, a friend recommended he try a job as an irrigation technician at Turf Valley Resort in Ellicott City, MD. After one season he decided to make golf course management his career path. He worked at several courses throughout Maryland, and ended up at Heritage Hills Golf Resort under Tony Goodley for two seasons before taking his first superintendents job at Pilgrim's Oak. Jed is a graduate of Pennsylvania College of Technology with an Associates degree in Landscape/ Nursery Management, and a graduate of the Golf Course Management program from the University of Maryland. He is also a member of the 3rd Battalion, 166th Regiment, Pennsylvania Army National Guard, and works as an instructor in his spare time. Jed is married to Sarah, and has one son, AJ who is 2.

Golf Course Profile

Pilgrim's Oak Golf Course is a family owned and operated public golf course located in Southern Lancaster County. Opening in 1996, Pilgrim's Oak has been rated 4 stars by Golf Digest places to play. The course's contrast of Bentgrass Tees, Greens, and Fairways along with bluegrass and tall fescue rough vake it a well conditioned playing surface with 18 unique golf noles. Pilgrim's Oak was designed by Dr. Michael Hurdzan. Dr. Hurdzan used the natural terrain of Pilgrim's Oak to design a course that has all the tradition of a classic northeast course, the design of a modern stadium course, and the playability of a great public venue.

Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Stressful Times By Darin S. Bevard, Agronomist July 30, 2006

Recent hot and wet weather patterns have superintendents on edge.

Hot temperatures have taken hold in much of the Mid-Atlantic Region with even hotter weather predicted in the coming week. Such weather patterns require patience from golf course superintendents and golfers alike. We are observing symptoms of stress-related diseases such as anthracnose and summer patch on greens. On creeping bent-grass, the mystery "patch" disease is beginning to occur regularly. When samples are sent to diagnostic labs, pathogens cannot be isolated. However, it is obvious that the turf is not healthy and under stress. To date, the summer has not been severe, but the next two weeks will be challenging.

To lessen the potential for damage from stress related diseases, implement conservative maintenance practices, especially on greens. Raise mowing heights, use solid rollers, and depend on periodic rolling of greens to enhance green speeds rather than double cutting and low mowing heights. More importantly, communicate to the golfers why these temporary changes in maintenance programs are necessary. In 2005, the majority of turf loss was ultimately the result of pushing the turf too hard under stressful conditions. Do not make the same mistakes this year.

Damage from second generation annual bluegrass weevils has been significant at many golf courses. Recently, annual bluegrass weevils were positively identified on the west side of Baltimore, Maryland. Significant feeding damage was noted. This is a new area with regards to actually finding annual bluegrass weevils in high enough numbers to cause damage. Scouting remains critical for this pest. Do *not* assume that declining *Poa annua* is simply succumbing to heat stress, drought stress, or growth regulation. It may be annual bluegrass weevil damage.

The summer stress season doesn't have much time left, but there are still a few weeks of stressful weather to come. Do not make decisions that you will regret. Carefully manage water and implement conservative programs until the weather breaks. It may be the difference between a good summer or a bad summer.

Directions To Pilgrim's Oak Golf Course

From Harrisburg:

Follow 283 East towards Lancaster. Exit 283 East onto Route 741 East. Follow 741 East for approximately 10-15 miles. Turn right onto 272 South. Follow 272 South for about 15 miles. Turn right onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From Lancaster:

Follow Prince Street South through the city. This will become 222 South/272 South. Follow 222/272 towards the town called Willow Street. In Willow Street stay on 272 South. Follow 272 South for about 15 miles and turn right onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From Reading:

Follow 222 South Towards Lancaster. Follow 222 through Downtown Lancaster. Travel on 222 South for about 3 to 4 miles south of Lancaster City. At this point 222 will bare left. Stay straight onto 272 South. Follow 272 South for approximately 15 miles. Turn right onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From Reading:

Follow Route 10 South to Route 1. Follow Route 1 South for approximately 5 miles. Exit Route 1 at the Nottingham Exit which will be Route 272 North. Follow 272 North for about 10 miles. At this point turn right onto Route 272N/222N. The two roads will run together for about 1/2 mile. When the two roads split be sure to bare to the left staying on 272 N. Go 1 and 1/2 miles and turn left onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From York (Close to Route 30):

Follow Route 30 East Towards Lancaster. Exit Route 30 at the Exit for Route 741 East. Follow Route 741 East for approximately 10-15 miles. Turn Right onto 272 South. Follow 272 S for about 15 miles. Turn Right onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From York (Close to Route 74):

Follow 74 South, until you see signs for 372 East. Turn Left onto 372 East. Follow for about 10 miles until you intersect with Route 272 South. Follow 272 South for about 5 miles. Turn right onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

From Philadelphia, PA:

Follow Route 1 South until you reach the last exit in PA which will be the Nottingham exit Route 272 N. Follow 272 N for about 10 miles. At this point turn right unto 272N/222N. The two roads will run together for about 1/2 mile. When the two roads split be sure to bare to the left staying on 272 N. Go 1 and 1/2 miles and turn left onto Pilgrim's Pathway.

Heather and Gorse

"I just want to walk down the street and have people say there goes Roy Hobbs, the best there ever was!"

--Robert Redford, as Roy Hobbs in the Natural

Critters, critters everywhere and not a drop to drink! An interesting month has passed where many of the stresses have been caused by moderate heat and humidity, coupled with substantial precipitation. While on the disease side, the usual suspects have been wreaking havoc, it has been more the insects that have been munching on a smorgasbord of turf. Over the past few weeks, I've seen cutworms, bluegrass billbugs, BTA grubs, sod webworms, and more orgasmic Japanese beetles than normal. Additionally, I've heard stories of chinch bugs, armyworms, and even some mole crickets (believe it or not!), although I've not specifically seen these with my own eyes. The bottom line moving forward is that if your turf seems stressed and you're sure you're up-to-date with your preventative applications of fungicides, get down on your hand and knees and start digging... You may be surprised at what you find!

Speaking of surprises... riddle me this Batman... take the current best golfer in the world, quite possibly the universe, and allow him to essentially eliminate the only golf club in his bag that has held him back over the last few years and what do you get? You get an 11th major championship title and a third Claret Jug for El Tigre! If Jack Nicklaus is known for confidently stating that he didn't believe any golfer could beat him from the fairway, I believe we have now seen the reincarnation and possibly the redefinition of the best that has ever lived. This was an absolutely masterful performance by Tiger; with the only thing that kept the tournament close being a poor putting 3rd round, lest he would have won by at least five shots. As was, he basically three putted the final green to comfortably win by two over a divinely driven Chris DiMarco, who, if it weren't for Tiger, would have won a few major championships himself.

There are a lot of conclusions people can draw from the completion of the British Open Championship at Royal Liverpool Golf Club, one of which being the answer to the question of whether Tiger would ever get over his father's passing. I guess we can conclude that we need not worry about asking that question anymore! Through the tournament, Tiger only hit his driver one time during the opening round on Thursday... the rest was a series of 2 irons, with an occasional three wood mixed in, resulting in a ghastly ~80% of fairways hit in regulation and ~80% of green hit in regulation through the entire tourney. Game, set, match!

Following this victory and coming back home to the states, I wonder if Tiger's philosophy about hitting his driver will change moving forward. Paul Azinger seemed to think that Tiger is really not hitting his driver any better or worse than he has through his career... the difference has been that he has been hitting it more often. Once again that theory about beating him from the fairway comes to the forefront of my mind. Maybe Phil Mickelson can learn a thing or two from watching the films of this major event! Winged Foot bygones!

Additionally, has any other golfer since Jack Nicklaus come through under pressure better than Tiger? I heard an unbelievable stat during the final round... he's never lost a major when leading after the second or third rounds... furthermore, he's something like 33 of 35 (94%) in all tournaments when he's leading going into the final round. That's unbelievable! More unbelievable is the way the world's top golfers, save Chris DiMarco, seem to wilt away when he's in their presence... Sergio, Phil, Ernie, etc. They have to be thinking that if they were born in another time that they'd all have a lot more championship titles to date.

Funny it is how so very many people have questioned his focus, first with his marriage and then with him losing his dad. I haven't quite figured out whether we've come to expect so much out of him that when he fails we're perplexed, or whether there is a distinct group that really wants to see him fail. Either way, I will openly predict that whether you're a fan or not, you ought to stand up and take notice moving forward, because I firmly believe that his father's passing will make him more intensely focused than ever before and in most cases, that has meant everyone else is playing for second place.

Of course, I'd be remissed if I failed to mention how awesome that golf course appeared to play. I thought it interesting how one green keeper from the region described the biggest difference between managing turf in the UK and the US... the goal of the average superintendent in the US is to keep the turf growing, while the goal of the average green keeper is to keep the turf alive. I believe there is a lot we US agronomists can learn from watching our brethren over seas. I truly believe that there is something to this minimalistic approach.

All that being said regarding the US approach towards turf management, I believe that golfing memberships and green committees are largely at the root of these philosophical differences. Tell the average golf course membership that off color turf is much healthier than emerald green turf and they'll look at you sideways like you've been smoking too many of those psychedelic mushrooms growing out behind your maintenance shop! Consistently produce slightly off color conditions and most of you would be looking for a new job and pondering what in the world is meant when your former employers talk about wanting a grass farmer who could take the golf course to the next level! Can anyone define for me the next level? I personally don't know what it means, but I know a lot of good men that have lost their jobs because of it!!!

Furthermore, while I conceptually really like the minimalistic approach, I also like greens that roll true and consistent. One comment I heard from several PGA Tour player interviews pertained to the inconsistency regarding the green speed. While there were no "sun-dried broccoli" criticisms, there were comments about how you could see the ball speed change as the ball rolled between the drier patches of turf, the greener patches, and those somewhere in between.

Inside the perfectly imperfect world of heather and gorse, I'd opt for melding the two extreme philosophies and meeting somewhere in the middle, slightly tilted towards the minimal maintenance side. In my travels over the past five years as a lowly manufacturing rep, I'd say that if I had to give one primary critique of the general turf management of golf courses in the US and how to best improve that management, I'd have to say that the water and fertility management at average golf course needs the most improvement. The primary differentiator between the good, the better, and the best superintendents is that the best have an extremely keen understanding of how water and fertility agronomically impact the quality and playability of the turf surfaces. And by the way, keep in mind that when I speak of fertility I'm not talking specifically about nitrogen, although that's what the average Joe seems to focus upon. Regardless, all that being said, it is substantially easier to be average in this world and, quite frankly, there is nothing wrong with it. In fact, for some people (like me), there is no other place they'd rather be!

That's my critter infested, disease preventing, always on my hands and knees digging around, usually in the fairway, rarely on the green, constantly drawing conclusions, often caving under pressure, minimalistic, always changing speeds, over watered, sometimes malnourished, and easy to criticize point of view from the heather and gorse.
