Mid-Atlantic USGA Update The Heat is On!

In spite of some cool weather patterns, expectations are already sky high for the upcoming season as more golfers in the Mid-Atlantic play golf with each passing mild day. In the past, when the Masters tournament was complete golfers were filled with expectations of prime course conditions. In more recent years, as soon as warmer temperatures arrive questions about putting green speed and smoothness are posed to golf course superintendents.

Folks, many of us had snow on the ground as little as ten days ago. It takes time to prepare the golf course in general, and the greens in particular. We are not in mid-season, and we certainly are not in mid-season form. Exercise patience as the grass needs time and warmer temperatures to grow. Dramatic temperature variations in conjunction with necessary aeration and cultural programs make it difficult to quickly return the greens to optimum conditions.

We continue to see spring aeration dates moved earlier in the growing season because of the golf schedule. While this may be acceptable, all parties involved should realize that this change likely increases the length of time that you play on bumpy greens because healing is slower when soil temperatures are cooler. The duration of disruption caused by aeration will be shorter if the greens are aerated when the turf is vigorously growing.

Seedhead inhibition applications are being initiated in the southern parts of the region, and other areas will likely apply seedhead inhibitors in the next 7 to 10 days.

Undoubtedly, we still have some colder weather to deal with that will slow turfgrass growth. This is especially true of bermudagrass populations that have not greened up in much of the region. Frosty nights greatly slow the growth of bermudagrass. Weather patterns are improving, but continued patience will be needed. Placing undue pressure on your golf course maintenance staff at this time of the year while most crews are still understaffed can lead to problems during the summer stress season. Certain practices are needed to prepare the turfgrass for the coming season. Allow time for them to be completed!



Directions to Susquehanna Valley Country Club

From Route 15 South:

The Susquehanna Valley Country Club is located just 12 miles south of Lewisburg in Hummels Warf, PA. When driving on Route 15 South, pass through Shamokin Dam and take the first right after Dairy Queen onto Mill Road. Veer right onto Country Club Road and continue until you reach the SVCC entrance.

From Route 15 North:

The Susquehanna Valley Country Club is located less than three miles north of Selinsgrove in Hummels Warf, PA. When driving on Route 15 North, turn left onto Lori Lane at the traffic light by Lowe's. At the stop sign, turn right onto Mill Road. Continue Mill Road for about 100 yards, and make a left onto Country Club Road.

From Interstate 80 East:

If you are traveling Route 80 East to the Susquehanna Valley Country Club, merge onto 15 South via exit 210A toward Lewisburg. Travel on Route 15 South for 17.8 miles. Turn right onto Mill Road, just after the Dairy Queen. Veer right onto Country Club Road and continue until you reach the SVCC entrance.

From Route 80 West:

If you are traveling from Route 80 West to the Susquehanna Valley Country Club, take exit 224 (South 54) toward Danville/Sunbury. Travel on 54 South for 3.2 miles and turn right onto Route 11 South. Follow Route 11 South for 16 miles. Pass through Shamokin Dam and take the first right after Dairy Queen onto Mill Road. Veer right onto Country Club Road and continue until you reach the SVCC entrance.



Happy 68th Anniversary CPGCSA!!!!

On Tuesday evening April 11, 1939 a meeting was held at the Colonial Country Club in Harrisburg for the purpose of organizing the greenskeepers of the area. Those in attendance at this meeting were George Morris, Riley Heckert, Hugh McJunis, James Morrison, Charles Bolton, John Grove, Jack Narril, and Al Heron. At this meeting it was decided to call the group "The Central Pennsylvania Greenskeepers Association". Officers elected were George Morris - President, Hugh McJunis - Vice President, and Riley Heckert - Secretary-Treasurer. Meetings were scheduled for the second Monday of each month with monthly meetings March through November. Dues to cover expenses were set at \$3.00 and the first meeting was set for May 8, 1939 at the Colonial Country Club.

Riley Heckert sent letters to all greenskeepers in the area to announce the gathering. The day started with golf in the afternoon and was followed by dinner. Following dinner Mr. Musser and Mr. Benham from State College and County Agent Fromeyer spoke about fairway grasses, heights of cut for bluegrass and fertilization. Following the educational sessions a business meeting was held and Edward Zwick and E. P. Morris were taken into the Association as new members, raising the membership to ten.

During 1939 the membership grew to thirteen members and at the November meeting the members decided that they wanted to continue meeting throughout the winter rather that wait until March as originally planned.

The Association was a success, just as today, 68 years later.


