## Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

### Working Together Can Make A Difference

Recent travels have provided evidence that the Hyperodes weevils are present in significant numbers. For example, second generation populations were found in Berkley Springs, West Virginia. While these insects can be controlled, it is alarming that the populations continue to migrate further south as they attack *Poa annua*. Continue to check the turf before a fungicide application is performed. Insect activity may be the primary cause of a secondary opportunistic disease.

The dryness of the season is still a hot topic and irrigation systems are being tested. Deficiencies are becoming more evident as the season continues. With the browning turf come questions from golfers and an urgent need to prioritize irrigation application.

- \* Do I treat the rough and risk over watering the fairways?
- \* Do I treat the green banks and risk over watering the greens?
- \* Do I use my overhead system because I am understaffed and cannot use hand held irrigation as much as I need to?
- \* If I have to ration my water supply how do I prioritize?
- \* What rough should be allowed to go dormant?

Off-color turf is not unplayable. It is far better to irrigate for the health of the turf than risk damage due to saturated soil conditions. Trying to stretch beyond the limitations of a system will cause problems. Areas of irrigation head overlap will be too wet while peripheral areas remain dry. If labor is not available then it is unrealistic to expect that hand held hoses can be used to

As I write this letter, Peggy, Robert and Kevin are somewhere over the Atlantic Ocean making their way home. God, I miss them! The golfing tour is over (for a few days) and I can't wait to see them.

Our thanks go out to Bill Wall and his staff at Deer Valley for hosting our July meeting. We all enjoyed the bunkerless, bluegrass fairway, LARGE greens golf course. The course was in fine condition. I certainly enjoyed it. Thanks, Bill!

My trip to Ireland was great! My nine vacation days of staying in bed till nine was wonderful! People don't get moving over there earlier than 8:30 am. The very small town of Kilkee, County Clare (one hour west of Shannon Airport) is on the central (north to south), west coast of Ireland. The town has no stop signs, no traffic lights, and one or two yield signs. Kilkee is where Peggy grew up before she moved to Queens, New York with a friend at age 24. After meeting Peggy while I was an assistant in Long Island, she was stuck with me. The local people earn money by running their own pubs, small shops, construction, and farming. Peggy's two sisters and brother have resided in Kilkee since birth along with their mother. During our stay in Kilkee we live with her mother. If you walk outside the front door and across the street, you are at the beach. The town is a holiday (vacation) spot for families coming from the inland. Holiday homes are full for the summer time.

The beer is cold, and yes, so is the Guinness (I do not drink Guinness). You have to acquire a taste for it. Going from town to town you pass a few thatched roof houses, very narrow roads (drive on the left), and man-made, stone built walls that act as property borders. These act like fences to keep the cows in their pastures. You can see all grass for a few miles with a few spotty farm houses on a hillside before you come up on a town full of old buildings that are jammed packed together. The small cars park on both sides of the street which only allow one car to pass. The sidewalks are just wide enough for two people to walk side-by-side. Of course, we have all seen pictures in magazines, movies, or papers, showing an older gentleman riding his rusted, two-wheeled bicycle, and wearing a wool sport coat; you see plenty of them as you drive down the old country roads. Things don't move to quickly!

I played golf two times (yes, only twice) during my stay. I played at Lahinch Golf Club. A few showers fell during my round. I used a caddy. He was 17 and he lived in his small camper across the street from the course in a community parking lot. He is from Dublin (west side of the country) and travels over during his summer break. He has been doing this since he was 13. He uses the community shower to wash up and loves every minute of it. He works as a bar back in the evening to make more money. It was just he and I on this gloomy, cloudy, rainy day. We were the first group out at 8:00 am and finished in three and half hours. I have played Lahinch five or six times since I met Peggy. Talk about links golf. No golf carts, no divot bottles, five foot flag sticks, NO TREES, rolling fairways, wispy Fescue, and the wind whipping west to east off the ocean. If you can't keep your ball low, get the weed wacker out because you'll be playing from the two foot tall Fescue areas most of the time. I played a few shots from there.

The greens were mainly Fescue with a tint of Bent and some Poa. I was talking with the Greenskeeper before playing and he said that *Primo* was just labeled in Ireland two weeks before my arrival. Of course, he was a little skiddish on using for the first time, but was very excited about the product. Heather and Gorse, any help on this product in Ireland? In Ireland, chemicals are very hard to come by seeing that their EPA is very strict on what is allowed to be sprayed on their sandy soils. As I was practicing on the putting green, here comes a tractor driven by an older gentleman, pipe in mouth, and he had his black, knee high Wellington boots on. He was pulling a small trailer loaded up with four men from the greens crew. They all hopped out (not to quickly) when the tractor stopped and started hand-picking weeds out of the Fescue areas. The other course I played was the local Kilkee Golf Club. The golf course has one Greenskeeper (year-round) and two seasonal crew members. That's all! Number three is a 298 yard par-4 that sits right next to a 300 foot cliff. The wind was coming over the edge so hard that you had to aim out and over the cliff edge to keep your ball from being blown to far right into the Fescue grass. The course only has irrigation around the putting greens. Golfers always walk and pull a trolley (pull-cart).

I enjoyed my family vacation with Peggy, Robert and Kevin. We went for "Cliff Walks", walked on the beach, and rode the street train (their favorite). I plan on going back next year (who is coming?) and play more golf. The boys have fun with their relations and I relax as much as I can. If you have the chance to visit Ireland, take the opportunity and go. You'll love every minute of it!

I hope to see all of you at our next venue for the "Supers Cup" on August 7th. The match play event competition will be exciting. We need to bring the Cup back to CPGCSA after losing it last year at Pilgrim's Oak.

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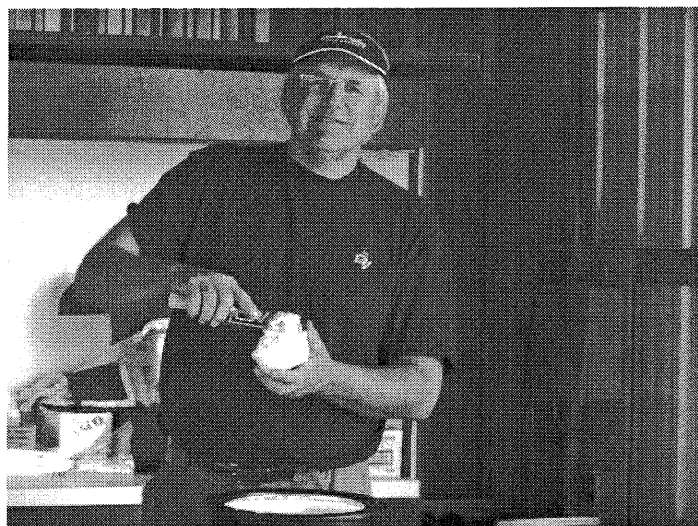

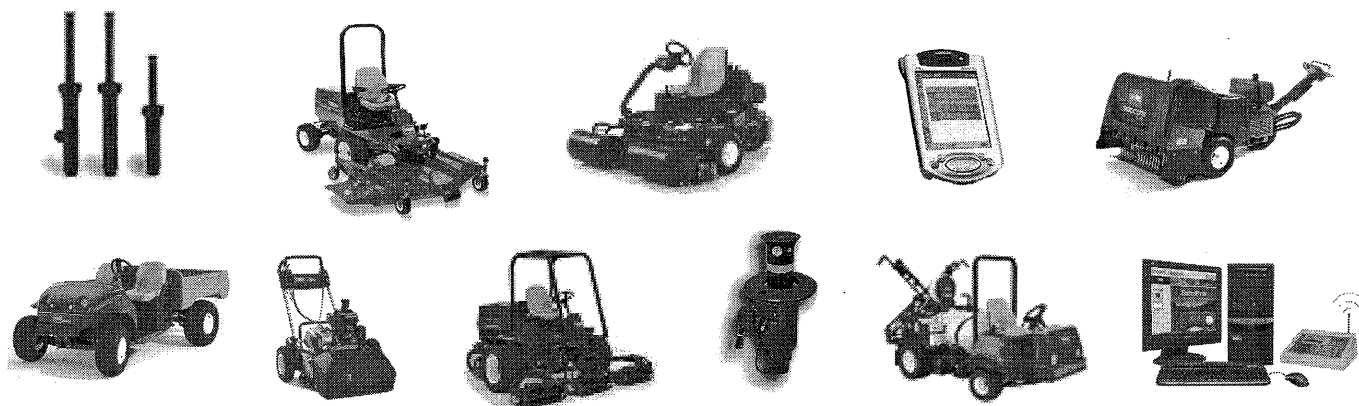
irrigate. During periods of extended drought, take the time to evaluate the system's weaknesses. Long range planning begins by first identifying a need that can be corrected.

One other concern that seems to be a common during Turf Advisory Service visits is traffic stress and how to control it. There may be a need to regulate traffic stress in areas of focused wear. Traffic patterns may have to be shifted in a regimented fashion. It may even be necessary to ask that golfers drive in the fairways rather than wear the rough immediately adjacent to the fairway turf. I am sure many have heard of the "90 degree rule." Just make sure the angle to which this is measured is clearly identified. Crossing 90 degrees to the playing direction of the hole is suggested.

As we enter the long, hot days of the July and August it will be important to control as many stress variables as possible. Golfers need to cooperate, which may mean walking a few feet further and taking a less direct route to the golf ball when riding in a cart. Most often things get accomplished when people work together.

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## Heather and Gorse

'Tis the season of doom, disease and destruction... 'Tis the dog days of summer! I always hated July and August as a golf course superintendent. Always seemed that for these two months the only guarantee was that your golf course conditions were going to regress, the only question was how much regression you'd have to endure. For most this has been another interesting year... fairly typical for this region, some may even say easy.

While the disease pressure has been moderate, there have been all the usual suspects regarding disease (Summer Patch, GLS, Anthracnose, BP, DS, etc.). The only golf courses that have had issues are those who have tried to challenge and cheat the fungus Gods, which is always a risky game to play. Remember those cool day and even cooler nights in April, May, and June??? I hate to sound like a broken record, but those who started spraying in early May and have maintained a regular spray program simply aren't experiencing the same problems compared with those who pushed the cool weather gambit.

2007 may be remembered as the year of the insect! I was just at a golf course that was experiencing second generation of annual bluegrass weevil damage and they didn't appear to be just munching on the annual bluegrass! I often say to my wife at the dinner table when the children aren't eating their dinners... you know the annual bluegrass weevil has been known to eat creeping bentgrass under the right circumstances (Hey, never a dull moment at the DelSantro dinner table!). Anyway, there has been more discussion about insects than most anything else on the golf course. All sorts of beetles flying all over the place, sod webworms, ABW's, and even a few mentions of armyworm adults flying around in mass in the Midwest. Good gosh that's all we need! Nothing that a little dose of a good old synthetic pyrethroid won't cure! My only serious recommendation is to rotate your chemistries with your insecticides, just as you should do with your fungicides! With an election year coming up and the potential for future EPA restrictions ahead, you need to maximize your tool inventory... one never knows what tools will be available down the road!

As most of you know, July is British Open month! Hard to believe it has been eight years since the last Open Championship at Carnoustie! Eight long years since Jean Van de Velde took not one, not two, but a three shot lead... not into the final round, not into the final nine, but into the final hole... and proceeded to have every conceivable thing that could go wrong, actually go wrong. Eight long years since he hit driver right of the burn (which by the way was lucky)... hit his second shot off a right side grandstand support post into the schmutz (this is a very technical name a friend of mine created for extremely deep grass/weeds)... hit his third into another burn... drop into more schmutz... hit his fifth into a greenside sand bunker... hit his sixth onto the green... and then finally, when his entire world was crashing down around him, had the head about him to knock in a solid six or seven footer for triple bogey to force a playoff. Seriously folks that was one hell of a triple bogey! 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## Directions to Broad Run Golfer's Club

### From PA Turnpike:

Exit at #326 or I-76 Schuylkill Expressway exit at Valley Forge and take Route 202 South: Take 202 South to Route 30 bypass/Downingtown-Coatesville. Follow 6 miles to exit at route 340 Thorndale. Make a left and follow Thorndale Marshallton Road for five miles to Telegraph Road. Make a right and follow to first stop sign. Make a right on to Strasburg Road. Take first right on to Broad Run Road. Club will be 1/4 mile on right.

**From Route 30/Lincoln Highway/Lancaster:** Route 30 for 16.5 miles to Octorara TRL/PA 10 and follow for 2 miles. Left on to East First Street/PA-372 and follow for 1.3 miles then stay straight to go on to Strasburg Road. Follow Strasburg for 10 miles and make a left on Broad Run Road then a right on to Tattersall Way.

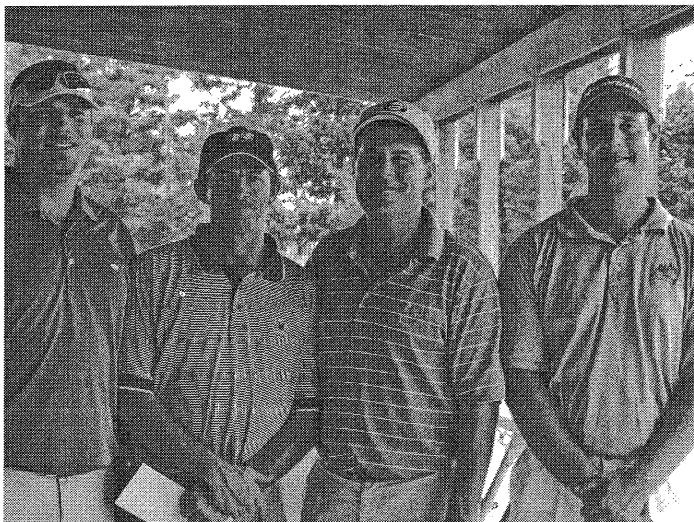
### From Delaware:

Follow 202 North to High Street exit. Take High Street in to town and make left on Gay Street [Iron Hill Brewery on the right corner]. Follow directions below for West Chester.

### From West Chester:

Take Gay Street about one mile until it dead ends at N. Bradford Ave. Make a right on N. Bradford and follow .25 mile until dead end. Turn left onto 162 West [Strasburg Road] and follow for 4.5 miles. When 162 forks to the left, stay straight on Strasburg Road. Go .25 mile past red barn on left and make your first right onto Broad Run. Entrance 300 yards on right.
