Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Control What's Possible, Manage the Rest.

Travels through the region have provided clear examples of how variable the weather can be. While some portions of the region are dry, others are saturated. As turfgrass managers know, saturated soil conditions and summer heat don't mix. If you do not have good drainage, damage is inevitable. As an example, a portion of the Mid-Atlantic Region experienced 11 inches of rainfall during June and the first week of July. Not the best conditions to enter the dog days of summer.

Control what you can:

- Monitor golf cart traffic and make every effort (with the cooperation of golfers) to shift wear patterns during this recent period of heat. Even foot traffic can be damaging, especially near bunkers and walk-on/walk-off areas to greens.
- Consider not mowing during the hottest part of the day. Mowing during extreme heat can damage the grass leaving wheel tracks that will affect the playability of the course.
- Mowing programs may have to be shifted to earlier in the day or later in the evening to groom the course for play. Early in the morning the soil temperatures are closer to the air temperatures. In the late afternoon, the warmer soils dissipate heat to the atmosphere as the air temperatures drop. This radiation effect can be monitored, providing a point of reference to begin late afternoon or evening mowing procedures.

- Carefully manage the water applied to the turf. Syringing to cool the grass is just that -the blades of the grass are watered to stimulate a cooling effect. As a breeze moves over the turf heat is dissipated to the air. If at all possible, syringe with hand-held hoses rather than overhead irrigation.
- The soils should not be overly moistened. Wet soils conduct heat rapidly and this condition can be lethal to the turf. Surface temperatures reading in excess of 100 degrees F. were recently observed. Prompt action is necessary under these conditions to save turf. Research has provided evidence that Poa annua becomes nonfunctional at 85 degrees F.
- Golfers may have to tolerate minor inconveniences early in the morning. Applying a very brief syringe after morning mowing can be beneficial. Depending upon the weather conditions, this practice could save grass.

While we still have four to six weeks of potentially trying weather ahead turfgrass managers are trying to get over the hump regarding turfgrass stress. Control the variables you can and manage the rest.

Directions to Moccasin Run Golf Course

From I-95 (Philadelphia Area):

Take I-95 South to Route 322 West toward West Chester. Take 322 West to Route 1 South. Follow Route 1 South to the Avondale exit and make a right onto Route 41 North. Take Route 41 North past Route 10. Continue on Route 41 North to next traffic light and make left onto Highland Road. Go about 1 1/2 miles to Bailey Crossroads (the main road will turn left) the course will be on the right and you need to turn right onto Schoff Road to get to the clubhouse. Clubhouse and parking lot are about 300 yards on left.

From I-95 (Baltimore Area):

Take I-95 North to Route 222 North Exit. Take Route 222 North to Route 276 West. Take Route 276 West to Route 1 North. Take Route 1 North to Route 10 (the second Oxford Exit). Take Route 10 North to Route 41 and make a left onto Route 41 North. Continue on Route 41 North to top of hill and make left onto Highland Road. Go about 1 1/2 miles to Bailey Crossroads (the main road will turn left) the course will be on the right and you need to turn right onto Schoff Road to get to the clubhouse. Clubhouse and parking lot are about 300 yards on left.

Route 30 East (Downingtown/Coatesville Area):

Take Route 30 West into the town of Gap. Turn left at light onto Route 41 South. Take Route 41 South about 7 miles to Highland Rd. Turn right onto Highland Road. Go about 1 1/2 miles to Bailey Crossroads (the main road will turn left) the course will be on the right and you need to turn right onto Schoff Road to get to the clubhouse. Clubhouse and parking lot are about 300 yards on left.

Route 30 West (Lancaster/York/Harrisburg Area):

Take Route 30 East into the town of Gap. Turn right onto Route 41 South. Take Route 41 South about 7 miles to Highland Rd. Turn right onto Highland Road. Go about 1 1/2 miles to Bailey Crossroads (the main road will turn left) the course will be on the right and you need to turn right onto Schoff Road to get to the clubhouse. Clubhouse and parking lot are about 300 yards on left.



Is It Really Localized Dry Spot?

At the time of writing this update much of the Mid-Atlantic Region has been very dry for several weeks. Some areas have been fortunate to receive rainfall, but by and large, it has been dry. Water resources are often listed as one of the greatest concerns for the golf course industry. As of July 1st, several golf courses are already being forced to make difficult decisions regarding their on course watering practices because pond levels are approaching critical levels. Without rainfall soon, it will be a long summer for many golf courses.

One problem that rears its head during dry times is Localized Dry Spot (LDS). LDS is a condition that occurs when isolated pockets of soil become water repellent. In many cases, a patch of wilting turf from as small as a dinner plate to much larger dimensions will be located immediately adjacent to healthy turf. Upon probing the soil in these areas, the soil in the wilted area will be powder dry and the soil supporting the healthy turf will be at normal moisture levels. These LDS areas are very difficult to rewet even with repeated hand-watering. Wetting agents can help, but the question that needs to be asked is whether or not the problem is really LDS or something else is at work.

In recent travels, the most severe LDS problems have been closely related to poor irrigation coverage. For example, insufficient overlap of sprinkler heads, irrigation heads interfered with by a new installation (e.g. a new flower bed), heads not coming on, heads not turning, sprinkler heads skewed at strange angles, etc. The bottom line is that water repellency issues may develop over time from repeated wetting and drying cycles, but the underlying cause of these problems in many instances is poor irrigation coverage. Be sure that you evaluate coverage from your irrigation system in these areas of LDS. You may be surprised what you find.

As far as the hot, dry weather goes, precautions should be taken to protect the turf. Limit cart traffic and reduce mowing frequency throughout the golf course. On greens, it may be possible to skip mowing one or two days per week and just roll greens to maintain speeds and ball roll. The goal is to protect the turf. Make sure that your irrigation system is functioning properly. Invest in the extra man hours with hand watering. Here's the bottom line, the current weather pattern quickly identifies deficiencies in the quality of irrigation systems.

This weather isn't abnormal as summer is fully upon us. Now is the time to use some caution when considering maintenance practices, pesticide applications and traffic management. When turfgrass is under drought stress, maintenance practices that would not normally create any problems can be devastating. Be conservative under harsh environmental conditions to keep the grass as healthy as possible. Remember, it is only the first part of July, there is lots of summer weather still ahead for our golf courses.

Really Now! Why are Fertilizer Prices so high
The 10,000 foot view
